February 8 General Meeting Cooking With Chef Nicci Stokes

Our cooking program at the General Meeting on February 8 stirred up quite a crowd with over 70 people attending our class on the "secrets of fresh herbs", we dined on Chef Nicci Stokes' creations of rosemary lamb, lavender shortbread cookies and bruschetta. Her recipes follow.





Lavender Shortbread Cookies SERVINGS: 24 PREP TIME: 10 MINS COOK TIME: 25 MINS TOTAL TIME: 1 Ha 35 MINS

Ingredients

2 tsp dried lavender 3/4 pound salted butter at room temperature

1 cup sugar

1 tsp vanilla extract

17.5 ounces by weight all-purpose flour (3.5 cups measured)

Instructions

- Grind the lavender up very finely using a mortar and pestle, until it is almost a powder.*
- In a stand mixer** fitted with the paddle attachment, mix together the butter, sugar, and
- lavender powder until combined and spread around the bowl.
- Add the vanilla and mix just until it disappears.
- Add flour to the bowl, and mix together until a dough ball forms.
- Roll the dough out on a baking mat about 1/2" thick, then cut desired shapes. Squares,
- rectangles, and circles all work well.
- Place the cookies on a sheet tray, and refrigerate for 1 hour, until cold and firm to the

touch.Preheat oven to 350F.

Bake the cookies for 20-25 minutes, until the cookies are lightly golden brown on the

edges.

• Let the cookies cool to room temperature and enjoy!

Notes

*If you don't have a mortar and pestle, chop the dried lavender as finely as possible with a knife, or bash it with a rolling pin.

**You can use a hand mixer as well, but you'll need to do more kneading and shaping at the end. The stand mixer will beat it into a cohesive dough that can be rolled, but a hand mixer will not. It just kind of "tosses" it about as crumbs, so you'll need to shape it more by hand at the end before rolling.

Rack of Lamb Recipe

(2 servings)

Ingredients

- 1 rack of lamb (about 1.5lb) 2 tablespoons fresh rosemary, chopped
- 5 cloves of garlic
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 1.5 teaspoons of salt
- 1.5 teaspoolis of sait

Instructions:

Trim fat off the rack

Generously add Olive oil, salt, fresh chopped rosemary and garlic.

Put in the refrigerator at least overnight for two days is even better.

Hint: I use an excess of garlic and rosemary and it makes it the best!!!

Pull out of the refrigerator and let it get to room temp.

Heat grill to 425 and cook for 5 to 8 min per side depending how you like them cooked and their size. I like my lamb medium rare....make sure the bones stay upright.

(6 servings)

Ingredients: 3 Roma tomatoes 4 cloves garlic 1/2 red onion 1/2 cup basil 2 tablespoons olive oil Salt to taste Splash of balsamic vinegar 1 loaf of baguette, sliced

For the crostini:

Put slices of bread evenly on a sheet pan Spray or brush with olive oil Bake at 350 for about 10 minutes.

For the topping:

Chop Roma tomatoes, garlic basil and red onion, mix together.

Add salt, oil and vinegar to taste. Serve on a crostini Enjoy!!!
